“Don’t tell anybody where you live when you are on the computer”

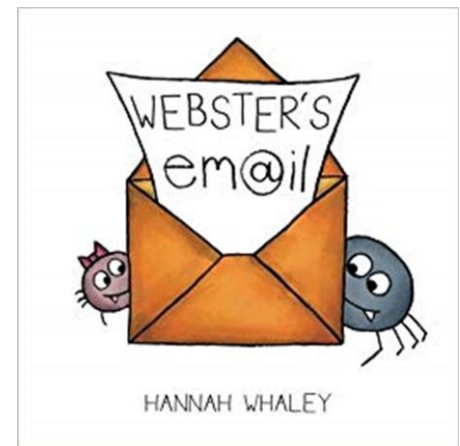
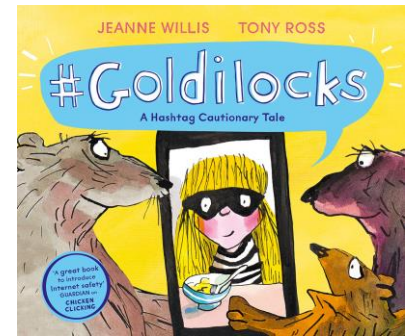
Class 4

What are parent controls?

Parental controls help you to block or filter upsetting or inappropriate content, and control purchases within apps. You can install parental control software on your family's phones or tablets, games consoles, laptops and your home internet

Parent controls can help you to:

- Plan what time of day your child can go online and how long for
- Create content filters to block apps that might have inappropriate content
- Manage the content different family members can see
